### **Author Talks**

Political commentator and attorney **Bakari Sellers** participated in our Author Talks series, discussing his book, *The Moment*, which explored issues impacting millions of African American families and communities across the country. Our programming often addresses histories of inequality that inform the challenges we face. We are fortunate to connect with authors who explore these difficult ideas and inspire dialogue and action.

### Community Conversations

Community Conversations provides a platform to meet forward-thinking problem solvers in our community for roundtable discussions, guided by conversation starters aligned with the evening's theme. This year, we centered our conversations on life in the New South, and housing justice and how it impacts on our communities. This series creates space for intentional conversations that enlighten and spark change.



LEVINE MUSEUM OF THE NEW SOUTH AND THE LATIN AMERICAN COALITION CELEBRATED THE 20TH ANNIVERSARY OF HONORING MEXICAN CULTURE THROUGH VIBRANT TRADITIONS, MUSIC, AND ART, WELCOMING OVER 18,000 ATTENDEES TO OUR ANNUAL DÍA DE MUERTOS FESTIVAL.

We celebrated history and culture through our free annual Family Days that honor Charlotte Pride, Día de Muertos, Three Kings Day, Martin Luther King Day, Women's History Month, and Juneteenth. These festivals invited thousands of local families to dance, sing, create, eat, and learn about Charlotte's diverse community.

### What Is It Going to Take?

We partnered with local universities, **Johnson C. Smith University** and **Queens University**, for our What Is It Going to Take? series. Discussions on voting rights, education, and resources for young and first-time voters, facilitated by students, filled the room at Johnson C. Smith University. Queens University students co-led a panel discussion on food insecurity in and around historically Black neighborhoods as we explored ways to make an impact.





## EDUCATION ENGAGEMENTS

### Field Trips & Group Tours

The Museum proudly hosted several educational groups, offering tours of our exhibition, *Charlotte: Moving Forward, Looking Back*, and guided walking tours of historic Brooklyn through our free app, KnowCLT.

We provided exhibition tours for students, including homeschooling students from **Homeschooling Footprints**, where the lead teacher, Kristin Jackson, noted that she learned 40 new facts during the exhibition tour and would later quiz her class. Students from **Berryhill School**, **Chester High School**, and other local schools also visited to explore the exhibition's rich storytelling.

We also led outdoor walking tours throughout the year, including a conference group from the **Black Child Development Institute** and students from **Carmel Christian School**, who participated in a curated experience that included a walking tour of Brooklyn, focusing on the history and contributions of African Americans in Charlotte, the historic significance of Brooklyn and its impact on the Charlotte we know today.



## EDUCATOR WORKSHOPS

We offered four professional development workshops for local educators focused on effective classroom discussion and debate, as well as assessing writing in the social studies classroom and beyond.

Additionally, the Museum had the opportunity to take our teacher professional development program on the road! We presented one of our workshops outside of Mecklenburg County for the first time. Twenty-one social studies teachers from Gaston County attended our *Facilitating Effective Classroom Debate and Discussion* workshop. We gave these teachers tools to cultivate classroom communities that foster meaningful discussions and civil discourse.

## COMMUNITY OUTREACH

During Black History Month, we partnered with **Trinity Episcopal School** and **Northwest School of the Arts** to present an art exhibition, *Reflections: Honoring Black Stories & Creativity through Art*, where student artists showcased their original works inspired by Black artists and historical figures. It was an inspiring evening filled with thoughtful dialogue and firsthand accounts from the young artists about their creative inspirations.



This summer, we partnered with **Made by Us**, the **New York Historical Society**, and history museums across the country
to celebrate Civic Season, a nationwide experience that invites
participants to reflect on identity, explore diverse histories,
and imagine the nation they want to see. Taking place between
Juneteenth and July 4th, Civic Season is meant to inspire
younger generations to connect with stories, tools, and ideas
that power our democracy. We hosted programs where
attendees could participate in lively and engaging trivia
games focused on Charlotte's rich history and an
informative social hour to learn about the latest efforts
to promote democracy locally and nationally.

We hosted the **Girl Scouts, Hornets' Nest Council** for Belonging & Becoming: A Celebration of Women and Girls. Young Girl Scouts explored the history of some of Charlotte's most well-known women through our exhibition, Charlotte: Moving Forward, Looking Back. They were encouraged to see themselves in the stories of these women and be inspired to make a difference in their community and the world.

# INNOVATION & DIGITAL ENGAGEMENT

#### 50 Places in Charlotte

We completed 50 Places in Charlotte, a digital history project highlighting the city's rich story through fifty places throughout the Charlotte-Mecklenburg area. 50 Places quickly became a crowd favorite, highlighting hidden gems and exploring the history in Charlotte's backyard.

### Our New South

Thanks to your listening, voting, and support, our podcast, *Our New South*, won Silver and a **Listener's Choice award** in the 2024 Signal Award's Public Service and Activism category and a **31st Annual Communicator Award for Excellence, Podcasts, 2025**. This Communicator Award presents the highest level of achievement, given to projects that demonstrate exceptional quality in the field.

Levine Museum presented at the **American Alliance of Museums** conference as part of a roundtable discussion on podcasts and museums, celebrating that Our New South has received 350k downloads since its launch.



## EXHIBITION HIGHLIGHTS

Charlotte: Moving Forward, Looking Back, on display through May 4, 2025, had an amazing run in our interim gallery space, creating educational experiences for Charlotteans, visitors and school groups. The exhibition shined a spotlight on the people, places, events and ideas that shaped Charlotte in a thought-provoking way.

Earline and her husband visited our museum in our interim space for the first time and were thrilled to discover a photo of her mom still on display.

She shared the inspiring story of her mother's participation In a lunch counter sit-in with her classmates, which took place on February 9, 1960. Remarkably, their visit took place on the 65th anniversary of the sit-in - February 9, 2025!

These connections remind us of the lasting impact of the stories we preserve and share.






